**About 1800, John Adlum established a farm of over 200 acres, a part of which became the old Bureau of Standards reservation on Connecticut Avenue. His special interest was American viticulture, and he wrote the first American book on making wine. He developed the great Catawba grape, which is his best memorial. A wildflower of the Alleghenies is named for him. He was first buried on his farm in 1836, and his grave was later removed to Oak Hill.
