*Jacob Fussell is recognized as the father of ice cream. Fussell was a Baltimore dairyman who, plagued with a surplus of cream during hot weather, came up with the obvious answer to his problem. He moved his business to the Globe House, at 12th and F streets, N.W., in 1856, and through both the Civil War and World War I it was at 1427 New York Avenue. In the process of giving his fortune to charity, this dour Quaker built and paid for a famous housing project in Baltimore for newly freed slaves.
